“TURNING POINTS” WITH PROFESSOR DAN DRUCKMAN

9/11, Pearl Harbor, the end of the Cold War, the Kennedy and King assassinations are some of the big moments in world history. They are widely regarded as turning points, largely because of their consequences. They were departures from the course of events that preceded them; some have even been referred to as marking the “end of history.” Turning points are also observed in everyday politics and international affairs as well as in social life more generally. And yet, despite the popularity of the term, turning points remain an elusive concept.

This Master Class offers an opportunity to explore this concept with leading conflict resolution scholar Professor Dan Druckman. We will discuss:

- Frameworks for analyses of key turning points
- Results from analyses of historical negotiations on Turning Points
- Prospective experiments on Turning Points.
